Farms and farmland both in Connecticut and the rest of the country, it is imperative to save every farm possible, including the Strong Family Farm.

The Year in Review

In its fifth year of events and programs, the farm continues to find new ideas and interests for programming. The farm motto is to keep open the barn doors to agricultural history and preservation, as well as create a special place to learn and have fun. *The list of programs and activities from this year include:*

Farm Store – Opened the day of the Chicken Run and then officially for the season on June 20 this year, the store itself is off and running. Last year Tracy, Keela, Javon and Quinn (who is now doing our wonderful newsletters and marketing) took care of the store. This year we have Judy taking on the task and we are looking for volunteers to help. Stop in and say hi! We are here when you need a tomato and much more, straight from CT farms!

Farm Volunteer Work Days – The work on a farm never ends, nor does the farm's ability to attract volunteers to help with the chores. The annual spring farm spruce-up day, just before the *5K Chicken Run*, got things rolling in early April. Volunteers put in several hours of work in the morning and then enjoyed chatting about the farm over a potluck lunch. New ideas come out of volunteer days when the farm puts on its face. We give special thanks to volunteers who showed up on such a COLD day – they did 4 hours of work in 3 hours!!! Volunteers will join us again in October to set up fifth, annual SFF *Harvest Festival*.

A young girl at the farm noticed a volunteer moving along the garden dumping something from a large bucket. "What are you doing with that stuff?" asked the girl. "Putting it on the strawberries." replied the volunteer. "What is it?" asked the girl. "Fertilizer" said the volunteer. "You ought to come to my house," said the girl, "We put ice cream on our strawberries."

Backyard Chicken Program (formerly *Adopt a Chicken*) – In its fifth year, this highly successful and nationally recognized program (thanks to Quinn's beautiful, feature article in *Backyard Poultry* magazine) offers young and old alike the opportunity to adopt a farm chick (which remains on the farm), see it grow into a laying hen and attend events every other week. The



activities include chicken visits, farm oriented crafts, sample farm chores, games and an education series.

<u>**Civil War Kids' Camp**</u> – In it's 2nd year, the Civil War Day Camp had a full regiment of 24 enlistees – both boys and girls. Organized by Frank Niederwerfer, the Civil War Reenactors of the Alden Skinned Camp of the Grand Army of the Republic and the 14th CT Volunteer Infantry Co. G, all enjoyed a day of full enlistment and Civil War experiences. Discharge papers are given at the end of the day. This will be held again in September, 2018. <u>Scarecrow Contest</u> – This annual contest, now in its sixth year of fun, invites businesses, groups, families and individuals to express their creativity by decorating the Peterson Road and West Street farm fences with sensational, seasonal scarecrows. Local judges award prizes for a variety of categories and the community gets to view the scarecrows for several weeks. It never gets old!

Farm Fencing - The new perimeter post and rail fence on West Street hosted an array of scarecrows last year. That completed portion of the fencing is lined with commemorative plaques purchased by fence sponsors to remember and honor. The Peterson Road section of the fence is slated to be installed soon, but there are still many rails and posts that will need plaques for that long and beautiful section of quiet roadside fencing. Each rail and post can be a memorial to a loved one or honor a friend or family member. The cost of a rail is \$50 and a post is \$100, including the memorial plaque. Take a walk along the completed portion of the fence and experience fond memories with a beautiful view of the farm in the background.

<u>Harvest Festival</u> - Held on October 21, 2017, the annual *Harvest Festival* continues to be a growing attraction at the farm with attendance estimated at over 400. The event offers a visit with farm animals, demonstrations of farm activities such as canning, working tractors, a corn box, seasonal craft projects for children, pumpkins checkers and a hay bale pyramid. It also provides a platform to meet local farmers and non-profit organizations in Vernon as well as crafters and artisans. There was also music by our friends, Gypsy *Hearts*, and a raffle that supported our Gold Girl Scout project of bees on the farm by Jasmine Kermode. It is the last day of the store and is one of our best sales days. For 2018, new food vendors and attractions are being planned.

Chicken Race - The fifth annual 5K Chicken race was held on a **COLD** Sunday, April 7. 2018. Over 100 runners, 27 kids, 18 walkers moved their feet to the farm and were, once again, welcomed to the farm by our new buff "Clucky" the chicken mascot. The race was recorded by the Community Voice Channel and is shown with images of past years on its local television station. It is also available to watch on YouTube, along with the *Harvest Festival*. The event was another great fundraiser for the farm and attracted a record number of sponsors.



Walk a mile with us next year – you do not need to run to enjoy the fun. We want to thank our 46 volunteers including Vernon

Police Explorers and Vernon CERT! It was 29 degrees that morning with a nice northerly breeze! This year we opened the farm store for race day. There is always something for everyone!

<u>Of Bees and Pollinators</u>– Center Road School parents, led by Lea Castle, secured a Pratt & Whitney grant to plant pollinators and put blue bird houses up at SFF and at the Belden property in Vernon. Families came to the farm on Earth day and planted pollinator plants and cleared the invasive plants on our joint fence line with the help of

Jane Seymour of the CT DEEP and our faithful volunteer, Loyd Johnson. This makes "Jasmine's Bees" happy. Jasmine Kermode was awarded her Gold Girl Scout award this spring and her project was bringing bees to the farm under the mentorship of our apiary specialist Walt Moody. We are currently in search of a new volunteer to pick up this project under Walt's mentorship.

<u>Co-op Gardening</u> – A goal here at the farm is to engage the community in vegetable gardening. A grant from the Connecticut Department of Agriculture to create accessible, raised bed planters enables all members of the community to enjoy this activity. The purpose of the traditional vegetable garden on the farm is to create gardening experiences and produce vegetables for both the community gardeners and the farm stand.

<u>Community Service Host</u> – The farm continues to host many Vernon youth groups. The farm also invites many different schools students to perform their community service learning and practicing farm-related activities. RHS Agricultural Education students, in particular, have become a fixture at the farm. Each year new and returning students help with all manner of farm projects from preparing planting beds and harvesting crops to painting, creating signs, helping with craft projects, as well as volunteering to assist with events, programs and the farm store.

<u>4-H Meetings Host Site</u> – The farm is an ideal place for animal and agriculture oriented 4-H groups to hold their meetings. Our *Hop-A-Long Gang 4-H Club* meets on the farm and learns how to care for their animals and prepare them for shows. Norman Strong was an active 4-H member and leader and would be proud!

<u>Stepping Out!</u> - SFF goes on the road to promote the farm in many different venues. This past year we participated in the Vernon Historical Society's *November Craft Fair*, Community Voice Channel's *Meet the Easter Bunny* with our new "Clucky", the 2018 Vernon *Healthfest, LiveFitCT* at Mt. Southington, and Rockville Community Alliance's *National Night Out* – to name a few!

<u>**CT Open House Day**</u> – SFF participated in the CT Department of Tourism's *Open House Day* in June, collaborating with the Vernon Historical Society and the Vernon Garden Club. Sixty-eight visitors came to the farm and enjoyed free seeds and garden advice from the Vernon Garden Club volunteers. Antique farm tools were on display and visitors enjoyed talking with Vernon Historical Society's tool expert Paul Magelony. The Strong Family Farm opened the store for the day and did farm tours.



Vision for the Farm's Future

The SFF enthusiasts continue to spend time creating a vision of what the farm will look like, how it will best achieve the project's mission and how it will become a self-sustaining enterprise.

We have enlisted the help of a Master Gardener student and the input of countless professionals and visionaries. This is how we are beginning to see the farm. Take moment to review the vision and give us your feedback. We want to embrace our mission of keeping the historical aspects, yet embrace the future.

Hay barn - The hay barn, the largest section of the barn complex now has its new floor. A large door is now being added to the back of the hay barn, allowing the barn to be flooded with light when opened along with adding stabilization to the west wall. Descending from the new door will be a broad set of stone stairs which will lead into a large stone landscaped terrace with room for dining and gathering. The barn will be available for weddings and other formal and informal events. It can also host farm-totable dinners and other dining experiences.

Commercial kitchen – At the opposite end of the hay barn is an existing chicken house shed row. It will become a commercial kitchen with a classroom and restrooms. The commercial kitchen will be used by the community to rent so they can do canning, make jams and other produce other marketable products. This can be for farm sales, home consumption, or other commercial uses. Workshops and classes will be held in the kitchen and the classroom. The kitchen will also serve as the staging area for farm dining experiences and/or for caterers to support other events.

Landscaping and gardens – The six acres of farmland will be transformed into both commercially viable gardens as well as beautiful native wildflower and cultivated flower landscapes. A memorial orchard now stands at the west end of the field. A pond might be carved and landscaped from the lowland section of the pasture to attract native birds. Walking paths, sitting areas and livestock viewing areas will be added so that the entire property can become a destination, natural experience. Tall plantings on the edges of the pasture will camouflage the outside structures to make the property picture perfect.

<u>Parking lot</u> – A modest, landscaped, pea gravel parking lot will be added in the pasture off Peterson road to blend with the rest of the landscaping while adding a safe and inviting entrance to the farm.

<u>Pavilion</u> – At the corner of Peterson Road and West Street, a gazebo-type structure will be built on the existing stone foundation. This will give provide an elevated, restful viewing area of the entire property.

<u>Community garden</u> – A community vegetable garden will continue to exist in its current location on West Street but it will be expanded and a new fence next to the garden on

West Street will be installed to both highlight the garden and make a new staging area for sun flowers and the farm's annual scarecrow contest.

<u>Memorial Orchard</u> – Over two years old now, the young orchard is bearing its first fruits. Not yet mature, the orchard is also a place to reflect.

Infrastructure – A new electrical system was needed at the barn to accommodate all of the new projects. A commercial meter and wiring was installed, and will pave the way for future electrical and plumbing projects.

<u>Museum Area</u> – We envision a history of the Strong farm and family farms museum area in the dairy barn area.

We need an architectural drawing of all of the proposed changes to the property in order to bid the project.

ADA accessibility is a priority and it is hoped that funds and grant money can be obtained to make as much of the property accessible as possible.
